

UNITED STATES AREAS WITH SHELTER-IN-PLACE/STAY-AT-HOME ORDERS

As of March 25, 2020

As the United States sees more positive cases of COVID-19 rise, states, cities, and tribes have been ordering shelter-in-place or stay-at-home orders. Listed below are all the areas in which these orders have been placed and what it means.

San Francisco

- Eight Bay Area counties have shelter-in-place orders in place, including [Alameda](#), [Contra Costa](#), [Marin](#), [San Francisco](#), [San Mateo](#), [Santa Clara](#), and [Sonoma](#) as well as the City of [Berkeley](#). [Napa County](#) has announced orders that go into effect Friday. The orders are currently effective until April 7.
- Public Health Orders require people to stay home except for essential needs, which are defined as:
 - Buy food, groceries, or supplies
 - Obtain medical care
 - Work at a business that's deemed essential
 - Maintain an essential government function
 - Care for a family member or pet in another household
- Individuals may engage in outdoor activities, such as walking, biking or running, as long as you stay at least six feet away from other people.
- There are still many businesses deemed "essential" that remain open, although some with reduced hours. These include:
 - Hospitals and health care operations
 - Pharmacies
 - Grocery stores, farmers markets, food banks
 - Restaurants and other facilities that prepare and serve food, but only for delivery or carry out
 - Airlines, taxis and ride-hailing services like Lyft and Uber (although no share/pool rides)
 - Gas stations
 - Banks
 - News media
 - Hardware stores
 - Mailing, shipping and delivery services
 - Agriculture and food cultivation
 - Other services including plumbers, electricians, exterminators, laundry and legal services
 - Schools and colleges, although many public school districts have already canceled in-person instruction
 - Child care facilities, under certain conditions
 - Residential facilities and shelters for seniors, adults, and children, hotels, motels
 - Home-based care for seniors, adults or children
 - Cannabis dispensaries

- At this time, enforcement is on a voluntary basis, but the SF Mayor and Police Chief have threatened stricter enforcement if residents fail to comply.
- If your place of employment is not an essential business, the current shelter-in-place orders require that the business or facility shut down. Employees are allowed to perform “minimum basic operations,” as long as they maintain a distance of six feet from one another. Minimum basic operations include maintaining the value of inventory, ensuring security and ensuring employees can work remotely. Other than to maintain minimum basic operations, employees can only work remotely from their residences, according to the order. Put simply, if your work is not an essential business, you are not permitted to go to work and your employer is not permitted to require you to attend except to sustain minimum basic operations.

California State

- Governor Gavin Newsom announced 6:45pm on Thursday March 19th, that the State of California will put a [shelter in place](#) order in. This will be similar to the ones that Bay area has been doing.
- End date is “open ended”.
- There are still many businesses deemed “essential” that remain open, although some with reduced hours. These include:
 - Gas stations
 - Pharmacies
 - Grocery stores
 - Food: Grocery stores, farmers markets, food banks, convenience stores, take-out and delivery restaurants
 - Banks
 - Laundromats/laundry services
 - Essential state and local government functions will remain open, including law enforcement and offices that provide government programs and services
- Businesses such as the following are closed:
 - Dine-in only restaurants
 - Bars and nightclubs
 - Entertainment venues
 - Gyms and fitness studios
 - Public events and gatherings
 - Convention Centers
- Individuals may engage in outdoor activities, such as walking, biking or running, as long as you stay at least six feet away from other people.
- California state has made no announcement pertaining to enforcement

New York State (technically not called shelter in place)

- On March 20th, Governor Cuomo [ordered](#) New York State to take further action concerning the Coronavirus.
- Nonessential businesses are to keep 100% of their workforce at home, however the following have been deemed essential.
 - Grocery stores
 - Pharmacies
 - Banks
 - Hardware stores

- Laundromats
- Cleaners
- Auto repair shops
- Utility companies
- Warehouses and distributors
- Delivery services
- Skilled contractors such as plumbers and contractors
- Animal-care providers
- Transportation providers
- Construction companies
- Manufacturers
- Mass transit
- Starting Sunday new restrictions are put into place:
 - When in public people must maintain at least 6 feet. For those that have underlying conditions, compromised immune systems or are 70 and older, they must wear masks and not visit household with multiple people.
 - Provisions will be enforced. Businesses found to be noncompliant will be fined, however individuals will not be punished.
- For the next 90 days Cuomo has suspended any evictions across the state
- Nonessential gatherings of any size are banned

Delaware

- Governor John Carney of Delaware issued a [shelter in place](#) order. Starting Tuesday March 24th at 8 a.m. residents are ordered to stay at home and close nonessential businesses. This order will remain in effect until May 15, or “until the public health threat is eliminated.”
- This order has the force and effect of law and any failure to comply with the provisions contained in a Declaration of a State of Emergency or any modification to a Declaration of a State of emergency constitutes a criminal offense.
- Residents can leave their homes for essential activities such as getting groceries, picking up prescriptions, seeing a doctor, and engaging in activities essential to their health and the wellbeing of their families.
- Essential businesses have been instructed to remain open:
 - Restaurants for carry out only
 - Grocery stores
 - Liquor stores
 - Banks
 - Veterinary hospitals
 - Pharmacies
 - Drug stores
- Non essential businesses include:
 - Car dealerships
 - Clothing Stores
 - Performing arts companies
 - Schools

- Beaches - except for residents using the area to exercise or to walk dogs

Louisiana – Stay at Home Order

- Louisiana’s Governor John Bel Edwards issued a statewide [stay at home order](#) on Sunday March 22nd for Monday March 23rd starting at 5 p.m.
- The State of Louisiana is using Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) guidelines to determine who is [essential](#)
 - Health care providers
 - Law enforcement, public safety, and first responders
 - Food and Agriculture
 - Energy
 - Water and wastewater
 - Transportation and logistics
 - Public Works
 - Communications and Information Technology
 - Critical Manufacturing
 - Hazardous Materials
 - Financial services
 - Chemical
 - Defense Industrial base
- Meaning that the following are exempt for the order:
 - Healthcare workers and caregivers
 - Mental Health and Social Service Workers
 - Pharmacy employees
 - Workers supporting groceries, pharmacies, and other retail sales of food and beverage products
 - Restaurant carryout and quick-serve food operations and food delivery employees
 - Farm workers
 - Electricity and Utility Industry Employees
 - Critical manufacturing Employees (medical supply chains, energy, transportation, food, chemicals)
 - Petroleum, natural and propane gas workers
 - Transportation and logistics workers
 - Financial services and banking industry employees

New Orleans

- Does not include any significant new restrictions on businesses or residents than the Louisiana Stay at home order

Ohio

- Starting Monday March 23, 2020 at 11:59 p.m. Governor Mike DeWine is placing a [stay at home order](#). This order will be effective until April 6th and will be reassessed at that time as necessary.
- Although this order is mandatory, the Ohio National Guard will not be enforcing this order. Law enforcement officials will not stop residents who are on their way to or from work or who are out for necessities, or just taking a walk. People in gatherings in any size may be asked to physically distance themselves or go home.
- Essential activities are defined as for health and safety, for necessary supplies and services, for outdoor activity, for certain types of work, and to take care of others.
- Essential infrastructure includes:
 - CISA list
 - Organizations that provide charitable and social services
 - Religious entities
 - Media
 - Financial institutions
 - Hardware and supply stores
 - Critical trade
 - Mail, post, shipping, logistics, delivery, and pick-up services
 - Educational institutions
 - Laundry services
 - Supplies to work from home and essential business and operations
 - Hotels and motels
 - Funeral services
 - Grocery stores
 - Gas Stations
 - Pharmacies
 - Police stations
 - Fire stations
 - Hospitals, clinic, and healthcare operations
 - Garbage/sanitation
 - Public transportation
 - Public benefits (i.e. SNAP, Medicaid) hotlines
- Beginning March 26, all operating child care centers in Ohio must follow the following guidelines until April 30th with the possible extension if deemed necessary.
 - There should be no more than six children in a class
 - Ratios must be kept to one teacher and no more than six children
 - Children whose parents are employed by the same entity should be kept together whenever possible
 - The same teachers and children in each room should be maintained whenever possible
 - There should be limited use of shared space or mixing of groups

- If shared space is used, a rigorous cleaning schedule must be maintained
- Parent interaction should be limited at drop off and pick up

Philadelphia

- Mayor Jim Kenney has ordered Philadelphia a [Stay-at-Home order](#) “until further notice”.
- Under the order, all public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a single household or living unit are prohibited, except those permitted by emergency order.
- All residents must remain home unless they are engaged in essential personal activities listed in the order.
 - Going to purchase essential goods or food
 - Seeking medical attention
 - Caring for family member, friends, or pet in another household
 - Delivering essential goods or obtaining emergency services and attention
 - Reporting to job related to essential business
 - Outdoor activity is permitted
- Businesses are required to suspend physical operations and only have essential onsite personnel to maintain critical functions such as security and processing of essential operations that cannot be done remotely
- These orders are consistent with Pennsylvania’s. Philadelphia has clarified that these include life-sustaining services such as
 - Laundromats
 - Veterinary hospitals
 - Retail banks
 - Cellphone repair
 - Bike repair
 - Emergency household repair
 - Extermination services for rodents and pests

Saint Louis – St. Louis County

- Effective as of 6 p.m. on March 23rd, 2020, the city of St. Louis put a [stay-at-home order](#) into effect. This order will last until 6 p.m. on April 22nd or until it is extended.
- Essential activities or tasks are for the health and safety of an individual or household and include:
 - Obtaining medicine or seeking a health care provider
 - Obtaining necessary services or supplies such as food, pet food, and other essentials
 - Walking, hiking, or funning
 - Performing essential services at essential business
 - Caring for family members in another household
 - Caring for the elderly, minors, dependents, persons with disabilities, or other vulnerable persons
- Essential business are as follows:

- Hospitals
- Childcare facilities
- Government operations
- Restaurants for consumption off-premises
- Food, beverage (to go, carry out or curbside), Liquor stores and cannabis production and agriculture
- Construction
- Law care companies
- Financial Institutions
- Pharmacies, health care supply stores, and health care facilities
- Grocery stores
- Gas stations and auto repair facilities
- Garbage collection
- Hardware stores, plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers
- Media
- Educational institutions for the purposes of facilitating distance learning
- Organizations that provide charitable and social services
- Laundromats, dry cleaners and laundry service providers
- Hotels and hotels
- Transportation, for essential travel
- Businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, and goods directly to residents

Kansas City

- Kansas city enacted a [Stay-at-Home Order](#) for their residents. Individuals may leave their residences or place of rest only to perform “Essential Activities”. All non-essential business or operations must cease.
- Essential activities is defined by:
 - Essential in activities or perform tasks that are essential to health and safety or the residents or their families
 - Obtain necessary services or supplies
 - Engage in outdoor activity, while complying with social distancing requirements
 - Care for a family member, close personal acquaintance, or pets
 - Essential activities do not include weddings, funerals, wakes, memorial services, or similar gatherings
- Essential business means any for-profit, non-profit, or educational entities, regardless its corporate or entity structure and includes:
 - Health care operations and essential infrastructure
 - Grocery stores, farmers’ markets, farm and produce stands, markets, food banks, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of food.
 - Food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing
 - Human and animal food processing facility workers

- Businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged and otherwise need individuals.
- Media
- Gas stations, auto-supply, auto-repair, and related facilities
- Banks
- Hardware stores
- Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers
- Businesses providing mailing and shipping services
- Educational Institutions
- Laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry service providers
- Railroads and rail systems
- Transportation
- Childcare facilities (with exceptions)
- Essential Infrastructure will include public works construction, airport operations, water, sewer, gas, electrical, oil refining, railroad, and rail systems, roads, and highways, public transportation, solid waste collection and removal, internet, and telecommunications systems.

San Miguel County, Colorado

- In San Miguel County, Colorado there was a shelter in place. This [order](#) lasts until April 3rd, 2020, however, it could last longer.
- Essential activities are as follows:
 - Performing tasks that are essential to health and safety of families and household members, including pets
 - To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves, family members, or household members
 - To engage in outdoor activity provided it complies with “social distancing”
 - To work at essential business
 - To care for a family member or pet in another household
- “Essential Businesses” are as follows:
 - Healthcare Operations, Essential Governmental Functions and Essential Infrastructure
 - Grocery stores, certified farmers’ markets and produce stands, supermarkets, food banks, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of food
 - Food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing; Businesses that provide food, shelter, and shelter and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals
 - Media
 - Gas stations and auto-supply, auto-repair, and related facilities
 - Banks and related financial institutions

- Hardware stores
- Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, internet or broadband providers
- Educational institutions
- Laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry service providers
- Restaurants and other facilities that prepare serve food, but only for delivery or carry out
- Businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, goods, or services directly to residences or other businesses
- Transportation
- Home-based care for seniors, adults, and children
- Residential facilities and shelters for seniors, adults, and children

Athens-Clarke County, Georgia

- Athens-Clarke County in Georgia has put a [shelter-in-place](#). This is expected to last until April 7th, however could last longer.
- Residents are required to shelter-in-place 24/7, aside from essential activities essential to governmental functions or to operate essential businesses.
- Exceptions for residents are as follows:
 - To travel to work or school to obtain supplies/materials
 - To obtain necessary supplies or medicines for your health or safety
 - For outdoor exercise
 - To care for family members or pets
 - To return home from outside the county
 - If you are ordered to be out by a police officer or judicial officer
- Essential Business are as follows:
 - Farms
 - Healthcare providers and facilities
 - Retail business that sell food
 - Restaurants for drive through and carry out only
 - Social Services and Homeless Shelters
 - Gas stations and care repair/parts stores, hardware stores
 - Service providers like plumbers and electricians
 - Post offices and Shipping providers
 - Laundromats and dry cleaners
 - Transportation Providers
 - Legal services, accountants, and realty companies

Illinois

- Governor J.B. Pritzker has issued a “stay-at-home” [order](#) for the entire state of Illinois starting Saturday March 21st at 5 p.m. This order will last until April 7th, however it could last longer.

- Residents may leave their homes, but only for essential needs such as going to the grocery store, filling their car up with gas, going to the pharmacy, or taking care of loved ones.
- Both state and local law enforcement entities are authorized to enforce the executive order however, Governor Pritzker will not let, “police every individual’s behavior.”
- Exempt businesses will still operate:
 - Banks/Financial institutions
 - Gas Stations and businesses needed for transportation
 - Stores that sell groceries and medicine
 - Hardware stores
 - Medical offices
 - Pharmacies
 - Public parks and open recreation areas (parks may be closed at the discretion of each jurisdiction)
 - Restaurants – take out only
 - Essential state and local government functions – law enforcement and offices that provide government programs and services
 - Media
 - Organizations that provide charitable and social services
 - Critical trades, including plumbers, electricians, exterminators, cleaning, and janitorial staff for commercial and governmental properties.
 - Educational institutions
 - Mail, post, shipping, logistics, delivery, and pick-up services
 - Laundry services
 - Transportation
 - Home-based care and services
 - Residential facilities and shelters
 - Day care centers for employees exempted by the Executive Order
 - Manufacture, distribution, and supply chain for critical products and industries

Pennsylvania Counties

- Counties included in Governor Wolf’s [stay-at-home order](#) are Allegheny, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Monroe, Montgomery, and Philadelphia
- Residents may continue to work if their employer is on the state’s list of life-sustaining businesses or has received a waiver
- Failure to comply with the requirements will result in enforcement action that could include citations, fines, or license suspensions
- Residents may leave their home to:
 - Take care of tasks essential to maintain health and safety, or the health and safety of their family or household members (including pets) such as obtaining medical supplies, visiting health care professionals, obtaining supplies they need to work from home

- Engage in outdoor activity, such as walking or hiking – if social distance is maintained
- To perform work providing essential products and services at a life-sustaining business
- To care for a family member or pet in another household
- To travel to or from educational institutions
- Travel required by law enforcement or court order
- The following businesses are considered life-sustaining:
 - Natural Resources and mining – animal production, forestry and logging, crop production
 - Construction – Heavy and civil engineering and specialty trade contractors
 - Manufacturing
 - Trade, Transportation, & Utilities – Grocery stores, gas stations, pharmacies
 - Financial Institutions
 - Health care and social assistance
 - Laundry services

Miami Beach – “Safer at Home” Emergency Order

- Effective March 24th at 12:01 a.m. the city of Miami Beach issued a “Safer at home” [emergency order](#). All people living within the city of Miami Beach are ordered to remain in their homes.
- All public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a residence are prohibited.
- All travel, including, without limitations, travel on foot, bicycle, scooter, motorcycle, automobile, or use of public transit is prohibited
- Exceptions for essential retail and commercial activities:
 - Grocery stores, convenience stores, food distribution centers, restaurants – take out only
 - Hospitals, pharmacies, and health care providers
 - Gas Stations, auto-repair facilities
 - Banks
 - Hardware stores
 - Businesses that provide postal/shipping services and other office products
 - Laundry service providers
 - Childcare facilities
 - Home-based care for seniors, adults, and children
 - Pet stores, veterinarian, and pet boarding facilities
- Residents and visitors may engage in outdoor activity and as long as people practice social distancing.

Blaine County, Idaho

- Blaine County in Idaho issued an [Order to Self-Isolate](#) on March 20th, 2020. The isolation order requires Blaine County residents to stay and work from home as much as possible while ensuring all essential services and business remain available.
- Essential services and businesses will remain open:
 - Grocery stores
 - Healthcare facilities
 - All utilities
 - Gas stations
 - Financial institutions
 - Residential and home-based care
 - Media
 - Hardware stores
 - Laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry service providers
 - Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, landscapers, and other service providers
- Essential Infrastructure includes:
 - Public works construction
 - Commercial construction
 - Construction of housing (in particular affordable housing or housing for individuals experiencing homelessness)
 - Airport operations
 - Water, sewer, gas, electrical, oil refining, roads and highways, public transportation, solid waste collection and removal
 - Internet and telecommunications systems.
- The isolation order does not prohibit outdoor activity such as walking, hiking, running, and biking, but at a safe distance between those who do not live in the same household.
- Residents may leave their place to obtain essential services or engage in certain essential activities and work for essential business and government services.

Anchorage, Alaska

- On March 20th Mayor Ethan Berkowitz announced that the Municipality of Anchorage issued a [“Hunker Down”](#) order. This order will begin on March 22nd and will remain in effect until 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday March 31st, 2020.
- The “Hunker Down” order mandates that residents shall stay home as much as possible, except to work in certain critical jobs; to buy, sell, or deliver groceries or other important goods; to receive or provide health care; and to get fresh air without contacting others.
- Some businesses and entities serve critical roles that are necessary to combat the Coronavirus. However, these business should practice social distancing whenever possible.
- Critical businesses include:
 - “Healthcare Operations” including hospitals, clinics, dentists, pharmacies, other healthcare facilities

- Businesses providing any services or performing any work necessary to the operations and maintenance of “Critical Infrastructure” including public works construction, construction of housing, airport operations, water, sewer, gas, electrical, oil production, roads and highways, trucking and shipping companies, public transportation, solid waste collection and removal, internet, and telecommunications systems
- First responders, emergency management personnel, emergency dispatchers, court personnel, and law enforcement personnel
- Critical Government functions, meaning all services needed to ensure the continuing operations of the government agencies and provide for the health, safety, and welfare of public.
- Defense and national security-related operations supporting the U.S. Government or a contractor to the U.S. government
- Grocery stores, supermarkets, food banks, marijuana dispensaries, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of food, beverages, or other household consumer products.
- Food cultivation, including fishing, hunting, farming, and livestock
- Business that provide food, shelter, and social services
- Media
- Gas stations and auto-supply, auto-repair, towing companies, and related facilities
- Banks and financial institutions
- Hardware stores
- Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation, and operation of residences and critical businesses
- Businesses providing mailing and shipping services
- Educational institutions
- Laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry service providers
- Restaurants, bars, and breweries, and other facilities that prepare and serve food and beverages, but only for delivery or carry out
- Businesses that supply products needed for people to work from home
- Businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, goods, or services directly to residents
- Home-based care for seniors, adults, or children
- Hotels, residential facilities and shelter for seniors, adults, and children
- Childcare facilities, subject to new recommendations for increased hygiene and social distancing. Childcare facilities should be used only by those who need childcare to work at a critical job.

Navajo Department of Health (Arizona)

- The Navajo Nation in Arizona state has issued a [Shelter In Place Order](#) for all residents to quarantine and isolate on March 20th, 2020. This order will remain in place until April 4th, 2020.

- Residents may leave their residences only to perform any of the following “essential activities”
 - To engage in activities or perform tasks essential to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their immediate family or household members such as obtaining critical medical supplies or medication, or visiting a health care professional
 - To obtain necessary services or supplies such as food, and products to maintain the safety sanitation, and essential operation of residential living
 - To engage in daytime outdoor activity such as walking, hiking, or running, provided the individuals practice social distancing.
- All businesses within the Navajo Nation, except “Essential Business” are closed.
 - Grocery stores, food banks, convenience stores, hardware stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of food and other household consumer products.
 - Food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing
 - Businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals
 - Gas stations and auto-supply, auto-repair, and related facilities
 - Banks and related financial institutions
 - Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, internet or broadband providers
 - Businesses providing mailing and shipping services
 - Educational institutions
 - Laundromats
 - Restaurants – for carry out and delivery only
 - Businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, goods, or services directly to residences or other businesses
 - Home-based care for seniors, adults, and children
 - Professional services, such as legal or accounting services

Connecticut

- On March 20th, 2020 Governor of Delaware, Ned Lamont, issued an [Executive Order](#) for residents of Delaware to stay at home. This order will last until April 22nd, 2020.
- This order declares that all non-essential business must work from home as much as possible or close, no later than March 23rd.
- Residents should limit outdoor recreational activities to non-contact and avoid activities where they come in close contact with other people.
- Individuals should limit use of public transportation to when necessary.
- Non-essential public community gatherings of individuals of any size for any reason should be canceled.
- If residents must leave their home, they must not travel in groups and keep at least six feet away from each other whenever possible
- Connecticut has defined the 16 critical infrastructure sectors by using [CISA's](#) outlines.

Hawaii

- The City and County of Honolulu implemented a [“Stay at Home / Work From Home Order”](#) on Monday March 23rd, 2020.
- All individuals currently living within the City are ordered to stay at their place of residence.
- All businesses with a facility in the City, except for “Essential Businesses” are required to cease all activities within such facilities, except Minimum Basic Operations.
- All public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a single household or living unit are prohibited.
- All travel except for “Essential Travel” and “Essential Activities” is prohibited.
- Essential Activities is defined as:
 - Performing tasks essential to health and safety or the health and safety of family and household members
 - To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves or family members
 - To engage in outdoor activity in locations as allowed by law
 - To perform work providing essential products and services at Essential Business or Minimum Basic Operations
- “Essential Businesses” means:
 - Healthcare operations and essential Infrastructure
 - Stores that sell groceries and sell other non-grocery products, and products necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation and other essential operations of residences
 - Food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing
 - Businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services
 - Media
 - Gas stations and auto and bicycle supply, auto and bicycle repair, towing services, and related facilities
 - Banks and financial institutions
 - Hardware stores
 - Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers
 - Businesses providing mailing and shipping and delivery services and businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages, goods, or services to residents
 - Educational institutions
 - Laundromats, dry cleaners, industrial laundry services, and laundry service providers
 - Restaurants and other facilities, but only for delivery or carry out
 - Businesses that supply products needed for people to work from home
 - Businesses that supply other essential businesses with the support or supplies necessary to operate
 - Airlines, taxis, and other private transportation providers
 - Home-based care for seniors, adults, or children
 - Residential facilities and shelters for seniors, adults, and children

- Professional services, such as legal or accounting services, insurance services, real estate services when necessary to assist in compliance with legally mandated activities
- Childcare facilities providing services that enable employees exempted in this order to work as permitted.
- Businesses that provide food, shelter, and other necessities for life for animals
- Hotels and motels
- Funeral, mortuary, cremation, burial, cemetery and related services.
- Critical trades
- Critical Labor union functions

Indiana

- Governor Eric Holcomb ordered four executive orders. These orders are [EO 20-08](#) Stay at home, [EO 20-09](#) Continuity of State Operations, [EO 20-10](#) Enforcement Directive Regarding Prohibition of In-Person Dining, and [EO 20-11](#) Provisions for carryout consumption of alcohol.
- The order [EO 20-08](#) takes effect Tuesday, March 24th at 11:59 p.m. The order ends on April 6th at 11:59 p.m. However, it could be extended if needed.
- The orders apply to the whole state of Indiana, unless residents work for essential business or doing an essential activity.
- Indiana State Police will work with local law enforcement to enforce this order. The Indiana State Department of Health and the Alcohol and Tobacco Commission will enforce the restaurant and bar restrictions.
- Essential business and services include but are not limited to:
 - Grocery stores
 - Pharmacies
 - Gas Stations
 - Police Stations
 - Fire Stations
 - Hospitals
 - Doctor's offices
 - Health care facilities
 - Garbage pickup
 - Public Transit
 - Public service hotlines
 - A completed list [here](#)
- Essential activities are defined as:
 - Engaging in activities or perform tasks essential to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their family or household members
 - For necessary supplies and services
 - For outdoor activity
 - For work deemed essential
 - To take care of others

- EO 20-09 for the “Relating to the Continuity of Operations of Government” will begin March 23rd and will continue until April 7th.

Kentucky

- Governor Andy Beshear has [ordered](#) all residents of Kentucky to effectively shelter in place, although he is refraining from calling it that. Starting March 23rd all nonessential retail will be ordered to close to in-person traffic.
- Businesses will be allowed to provide delivery and curbside pickup for any online orders over the phone.
- Life-sustaining retail businesses include grocery stores, pharmacies, banks, hardware stores, and other businesses.
- Listed in the Executive order are the businesses that are deemed essential:
 - Automotive Parts, Repair, Accessories, and Tire Stores
 - Auto, Truck, and Van Rental
 - Financial Institutions
 - Food and Beverage stores
 - Pharmacies and Drug stores
 - Gas stations
 - Pet and Pet Supplies stores
 - General Merchandise stores, including Warehouse Clubs and supercenters
 - Building Material and Garden Equipment and Supplies Dealers

Maryland

- Governor Larry Hogan has ordered all non-essential businesses to close on March 23rd. However, has not issued a stay-at-home order. Instead Governor Larry Hogan has issued an [Interpretive Guidance](#).
- The following businesses are exempt from the guidance:
 - Pharmaceutical manufacturers
 - Chemical manufacturers
 - Distributors of chemicals and pharmaceuticals
 - Lodging
 - Janitorial firms
 - Laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry services
 - Commercial and residential construction companies
 - Self-storage facilities
 - Building and property maintenance companies
 - Companies that sell supplies and materials for maintenance of commercial and residential buildings
 - Media
 - Internet and telephone providers

- Critical manufacturing sector – earth-moving, mining, generators, and power transmission equipment, parts for water electric and telecommunications utility infrastructure, medical equipment
- Defense Industrial base sector
- Emergency service sector
- Energy Sector – companies engaged in electricity production, refining, storage, transportation, distribution, and sale of oil, gas, and propane products, including gas stations and truck stops
- Financial services
- Food and agriculture sector
- Government facilities
- Healthcare and public health sector
- Information technology sector
- Transportation systems sector
- Water and wastewater systems sector

Massachusetts

- Governor Charlie Baker has ordered all non-essential businesses and organizations in the state to close beginning March 23rd. However, Governor Baker has not issued a shelter in place order, but only an [executive order](#).
- Businesses and organizations not on the list of essential services are encouraged to continue operations through remote means. Businesses can request that they be considered essential.
- Essential businesses are as follows:
 - Healthcare/ public health / human services
 - Law enforcement, public safety, first responders
 - Food and agriculture
 - Electricity, petroleum, natural and propane gas workers, steam workers, water and wastewater
 - transportation and logistics
 - public works
 - communications and information technology businesses
 - Educators
 - Hotels and motels
 - Laundromats and laundry services
 - Critical manufacturing
 - Hazardous materials
 - Financial services
 - Chemical businesses
 - Defense industrial base

Michigan

- Governor Gretchen Whitmer ordered all Michigan residents to shelter in place beginning March 24th. This [executive order](#) will continue through April 13th at 11:59 p.m.

- This order will prohibit in-person work that is not necessary to sustain or protect life.
- Individuals may leave their home or place of residence must adhere to social distancing measures recommended by the CDC.
- No person or entity shall operate a business or conduct operations that require workers to leave their homes or places of residence except for to the extent that those workers are necessary to sustain or protect life.
- Business and operations maintaining in-person activities must adopt social distancing practices and other mitigation measures to protect workers and patrons. Practices include:
 - Restricting the number of workers present to no more than is strictly necessary to perform the business's or operation's critical infrastructure functions
 - Promoting remote work to the fullest extent possible
 - Keeping workers and patrons who are on premises at least six feet from one another to the maximum extent possible
 - Increasing standards of facility cleaning and disinfection to limit worker and patron who are on premises at least six feet away from one another
 - Increasing standards of facility cleaning and disinfection to limit worker and patron exposure
 - Adopting policies to prevent workers from entering the premises if they display respiratory symptoms or have contact with a person who is known to have COVID-19
- Residents may engage in outdoor activity or conduct basic tasks necessary to their health or safety.
- Critical Infrastructure has been defined [here](#) by CISA.

New Jersey

- Governor Phil Murphy issued an [executive order](#) on March 21st for the state to shelter in place.
- Gatherings of individuals are cancelled unless explicitly authorized under the executive order.
- Non-essential retail businesses must close storefront and/or brick-and-mortar premises operations. All recreational and entertainment businesses must close to the public.
- Bars and restaurants in New Jersey must close for on-premise service and may provide take-out and delivery service only.
- Essential businesses are as follows:
 - Grocery stores, farmer's markets and farms that sell directly to customers, and other food stores, including retailers that offer a varied assortment of foods comparable to what exists as a grocery store; Pharmacies and medical marijuana dispensaries; Medical supply stores; Gas stations; Convenience stores; Ancillary stores within healthcare facilities; Hardware and home improvement stores; Vehicle rental locations; Banks and other financial institutions with retail functions; Laundromats and dry-cleaning services; Stores that principally sell supplies for children under five years; Pet stores and veterinary service locations; Car dealerships, but only for auto maintenance and repair, and auto mechanics; Printing and office supply shops; Mail and delivery stores; and Liquor stores.

Texas

- Dallas County, McLennan County and the city of Waco have issued shelter in place beginning March 23rd
- Mayor of Dallas, Eric Johnson, issued [shelter in place](#) orders on March 22nd.
- Waco City Council voted to extend Mayor Kyle Deaver's March 17th declaration of local disaster and concurrently shelter in place. The vote means the declaration and shelter in place order will remain in effect through April 7th.
- In McLennan County violators will be cited for class C misdemeanors. Residents may only leave their homes for essential activities.
- The order exempts hospitals, healthcare facilities, grocery stores, food cultivators, professional service provider such as accountants, hardware stores, plumbers and electricians, shipping agencies, those that provide any type of shelter, media, gas stations and convenience stores, banks, restaurants that provide takeout/delivery or drive-through service, laundromats and drycleaners, home-based senior care providers, janitorial and maintenance services and child care facilities.

West Virginia

- Governor Jim Justice has ordered all of West Virginia residents to [shelter in place](#) beginning 8 p.m. March 24th.
- All West Virginia residents may only leave their homes for essential needs or exercise.
- All nonessential businesses should close and restaurants should only offer takeout, delivery, or drive-thru.
- The order does not pertain to essential businesses such as:
 - Health care facilities
 - Food
 - Housing
 - Public Safety
 - Essential government functions
 - Human services
 - Transportation
 - Essential infrastructure
 - Financial institutions
 - Educational facilities
 - Funeral homes
 - Laundromats

Wisconsin

- On March 23rd, Governor Tony Evers issued an [emergency order](#) to all Wisconsin residents to shelter in place. All non-essential businesses within the state must close.
- All residents in the state of Wisconsin must stay home unless to do essential activities or essential business or governmental functions.
- All non-essential business and operations must cease, however, unless they are maintaining minimum basic operations.
- All the following facilities shall be closed:
 - Public and private k-12 schools and public libraries
 - Places of public amusement and activity
 - Salons and spas

- Essential business operations is defined by the CISA list, stores that sell groceries and medicine, food and beverage production, transport, and agriculture, child care settings, organizations that provide charitable and social services, funeral establishments, media, gas stations, financial institutions hardware and supply stores, critical trades, and mail.

New Mexico

- On March 23rd Governor Lujan Grisham issued a [Public Health Emergency Order](#) to close all businesses and non-profit entities except for those deemed essential and provided restrictions on mass gatherings.
- “Essential Business” means any businesses of non-profit entity falling within one of more of the following categories:
 - Health care operations
 - Homeless shelters, food banks, and other services providing care to indigent or needy populations
 - Childcare facilities
 - All food and beverage stores, animal supply stores, and other household consumer products
 - Farms, ranches, and other food cultivation, processing, or packaging operations
 - All facilities used by law enforcement personnel and first responders
 - Infrastructure operations
 - Manufacturing operations
 - Services necessary to maintain the safety and sanitation of residences or essential businesses including security services, and other skilled trades
 - Media
 - Gas stations and automobile repair facilities
 - Hardware stores
 - Laundromats and dry cleaner services
 - Utilities including their contractors and suppliers, engaged in power generation, fuel supply and transmission
 - Funeral homes, crematoriums and cemeteries
 - Financial institutions
 - Real estate services
 - Businesses that provide mailing and shipping
 - Laboratories and defense and national security-related operations supporting the United States government
 - Restaurants – only for carry-out, delivery, or drive-thru
 - Professional services such as legal or accounting
 - Logistics and businesses that store, ship, or deliver groceries, food, goods, or services directly to residents
- All mass gatherings are prohibited
- All businesses, except those listed above, are to reduce their in-person workforce by 100%. All essential businesses must minimize their operations and staff to the greatest possible extent.

Oregon

- On March 23rd, Governor Kate Brown issued [Executive Order No. 20-12](#) “Stay Home, Save Lives”.
- All non-essential social and recreational gatherings of individuals outside of a home or place of residence are prohibited.

- Individuals are prohibited from patronizing businesses that are closed.
- When individuals leave their homes, they must remain at least six feet away from others.
- Individuals may go outside for recreational activities.
- All non-essential businesses can tele-work or work-at-home.
- People that violate the Governor’s order could be arrested or cited, which is a C misdemeanor. However, officers will use this as a last resort.
- Essential businesses are as follows:
 - Food industry
 - Childcare
 - Banks
 - Pharmacy/Healthcare
 - Gas stations

Washington

- Governor Jay Inslee has issued [Proclamation 20-05](#) “Stay Home – Stay Healthy” on March 23rd. In which only certain retailers can remain open and residents can leave their homes to participate in essential activities. This order went into effect at midnight on March 25th.
- Essential activities are:
 - Obtaining necessary supplies and services
 - Engaging in activities essential for the health and safety
 - Caring for family members, friends, or pet in another household
 - Engaged in outdoor exercise activities
 - Employment in essential business services
- All mass gatherings are prohibited
- Essential infrastructure is listed, below however, more details are listed [here](#):
 - Health care/public health
 - Emergency services
 - Food and agriculture
 - Energy
 - Water and wastewater
 - Transportation and logistics
 - Communications and information technology
 - Critical manufacturing
 - Hazardous materials
 - Financial services
 - Chemical
 - Defense industrial base
